CITY OF PITTSBURGH MAYOR LUKE RAVENSTAHL

Dear Neighbors,

I hope all of you had a great Pittsburgh summer. I took advantage of the warm weather by attending some of the many events coordinated by Citiparks, as well as getting to know more residents and neighborhoods by visiting and walking the streets of our City neighborhoods.

In July we hit the streets with the third annual central Oakland "sweep." We cited more than 140 building code and safety violations ranging from overflowing trash cans to absent fire alarms. These sweeps are part of our effort to ensure that our Oakland community is a safe place to live, work, study, and play for the more than 20,000 college students who live in the area.

This summer we began extending our sweeps. In Larimer I had the opportunity to walk through the neighborhood with 11 of the Pittsburgh Summer Youth Employment Program high school students. They showed me the areas where they had worked hard clearing away litter and weeds. We also had neighborhood sweeps in California-Kirkbride and Allentown. We will be continuing the sweeps in other neighborhoods throughout the next year.

These sweeps help us to determine the best ways to allocate City resources and to improve the quality of life for our residents. As part of our citywide demolition plan we use the sweeps as a tool to target high priority, unsafe neighborhood houses and buildings. We also target City-owned vacant lots as part of our Green Up Pittsburgh program, where we challenge residents to become community stewards and create a community garden to help turn blight into beauty.

In addition to the neighborhoods, we're also conducting business district sweeps. Together with the Department of Public Works, we launched our Taking Care of Business (TCOB) program in Brookline on July 30, 2008. As part of the program we brought back five full-time "hokey patrols" to clean up storefronts. In addition to the hokey patrols, working from a list of action items delivered by 311 callers and businesses the TCOB crews cited properties, removed graffiti, painted road lines, and responded to on-the-spot concerns from citizens. After the TCOB sweeps business districts will begin to receive improvement hardware - items such as trees, street lights, bike racks, or gateway signage, based on a survey sent to the districts in March. This is part of our plan to provide our City's 50 major neighborhood business districts with clean sweeps, infrastructure improvements, and long-term strategies to renew the neighborhood.

Although each neighborhood is different, they all shared two common concerns - public safety and quality of life. We will be hosting a Public Safety Expo in the fall to ensure residents are aware of all the resources available to them.

One part of improving quality of life is fostering families. On August 10th my wife Erin and I hosted our very first "Family Night" on Flagstaff Hill, in conjunction with Citiparks Cinema in the Park. The evening was a combination of arts, crafts, storytellers, and performers. Children got to climb aboard fire trucks, police cars, and Public Works equipment. Parents got to learn about city neighborhoods and public safety. Although the film that night was cancelled due to weather, a great time was had by all and we're looking forward to our next Family event.

As summer is wrapping up, the first Pittsburgh Promise class of 2008 is preparing to go to college. The Pittsburgh Promise encourages our students to continue their education by helping to eliminate some of the financial burden. I am excited to say that we anticipate more than 800 of the 970 eligible students will be attending school in Pennsylvania this fall, and will receive an annual \$5.000 scholarship towards their college tuition. We are looking forward to hearing about their future success and continuing the program for the class of 2009.

I look forward to seeing you out in your neighborhood during our upcoming neighborhood and business district sweeps.

"Think Also of the Rights and Comforts of Others"


Those of you who know me and my connection to the public schools might laugh, because the above quote is the school motto of Winchester Thurston School, a private school. The intent of that statement, "think also of the rights and comforts of others," is the soul of a community, the very substance of a great neighborhood.

We have recently received quite a few calls in my office from constituents concerning neighbors not acting in a neighborly manner. "Folks are speeding on my street where senior citizens live," says one caller. "I just put in a new sidewalk for several thousand dollars and the neighbors think it is their right to park their cars on it," say three callers. "My neighbor's ivy is growing all over my garage and there's poison ivy in the mess!"

These are issues of being neighborly. Someone is not "thinking also of the rights and comforts of others."

There have been a few calls concerning more serious issues such as the dogs that snarl and bite, the collapsing home, and the garbage which is out in the heat. "My neighbors put their garbage out six days ahead and rats and bugs are all over the yards."

Of course we attempt to help with all these issues, and in many cases there are City services that cover them – arresting speeders and citing those who park on sidewalks,



for instance – but in general, these are matters which are addressed best by citizens practicing good, civil behavior.

So, I shouldn't need to tell you that we do not park on sidewalks, that we only put out our trash on trash day, and that speed limits are generally devised with some purpose. But I'm telling you anyway, because it's the neighborly thing to do.

STATE REPRESENTATIVE DON WALKO REPORTS

New Laws Make Pennsylvania a Leader on Energy Independence

The last time I wrote a column about energy independence, I said the high price of oil – then passing \$100 a barrel – was a major reason we needed to break our addiction to foreign oil. Since then, the price of oil has risen more than 30 percent in just four months. Fortunately, I have good news. In July the legislature passed major energy independence initiatives that Gov. Rendell signed into law.

Every year Pennsylvania residents and businesses send \$30 billion out of the state just to buy gas and other liquid fuels. That's about \$2,400 per person. Now we will be keeping more of that money here, creating jobs and reining in energy prices.

Already, the state's current energy investment programs have created more than 2,500 jobs. But funding has been limited and the state was only able to support 10% of requests, losing out on at least \$100 million in potential investments every year.

The new state budget package invests \$650 million in a mix of commercial and consumer efforts designed to help large companies, small businesses, and homeowners take advantage of alternative energy technology. Also, the measure includes funding for the nation's first standards for harnessing cellulosic ethanol and bio-diesel as motor fuels, with the potential to derive much of the fuel from non-food sources such as switchgrass, agricultural wastes, waste grease, and algae. And the high price of oil wasn't the only reason to act - electric rate caps are set to end in less than three years.

Projects under the new fund will range from investments in cutting-edge research to energy-saving weatherization efforts and tax credits for alternative energy products and programs, including help for homeowners and small businesses to install solar panels. The Department of **Environmental Protection has** said applications should be available in the next two to three months. If you would like to be among the first to know when the forms are available, just call my office or sign up at my web site www.pahouse.com/Walko.

Instead of a "gold rush," there is a "green rush" in alternative energy because of high prices. Pennsylvania is now in a great position to capitalize on it.

LEGISLATIVE UPDATE FROM SENATOR JIM FERLO

Looking Forward to Green Innovation and Consumer Savings

In tough economic times, it becomes a greater challenge to craft a responsible budget that helps Pennsylvanians thrive and provides new opportunities; we must ensure that we are tackling the problems of today and also looking towards the future. Many of us feel the pinch at the gas pump and in paying our bills, and I'm happy to tell you the legislature recently passed Governor Rendell's Energy Independence Strategy, which will create a \$650 million fund for environmental programs. The goal is two-fold— to take steps to enable consumers to conserve energy and to put Pennsylvania at the forefront of emerging alternative energy production.

Pennsylvanians are exporting \$30 billion per year out of state to buy fuel in the forms of petroleum and natural gas instead of keeping those dollars at home. The Independence Strategy will take crucial steps to build infrastructure here at home for clean energy production, reducing our dependence on foreign oil, creating jobs in new fields, and giving residents, businesses, and municipalities opportunities to "green up" through a multitude of venues and opportunities.

\$237.5 million will be targeted specifically toward helping

consumers conserve electricity and manage higher energy prices. Residential consumers and small businesses will be eligible for \$92.5 million in loans, grants, reimbursements and rebates to support energy conservation and weatherization projects that can ultimately reduce energy bills. The fund also provides additional support for the Low Income Home Energy Assistance Program (LIHEAP) and for the establishment of an Energy Efficiency Loan Fund through the Pennsylvania Housing Finance Agency, which will build upon the Renovate and Repair Program.

These programs will afford lowincome and elderly Pennsylvanians the opportunity to reduce energy costs and increase comfort while safeguarding health and safety. Funds will be available towards home repairs (roofing; installation of energy-efficient furnaces, water heaters, and heat pumps; insulation, ductwork, and sealing) and onsite energy audits can be used to identify the most pressing needs and plan for costeffective measures to correct the situations.

Act 78 of 2008 provides a market for bio-diesel and cellulosic ethanol requiring retailers to sell their fuel with an increasing percentage of bio material as target levels of production are being made. Special Session Act 2 of 2008 creates a 75 cents a gallon rebate for in state bio-diesel production up to 7 million gallons for the next three years, assisting companies to meet production demands and encouraging them to set up business in Pennsylvania.

As you may have seen in the news, Pennsylvania customers face the possibility of doubledigit rate increases in their electric bills due to the approaching expiration of utility rate caps. I will continue to advocate to hold utilities to the highest standards for rate making and to ensure customer protections; in the face of these pressures, it is all the more crucial that we invest in new forms of clean energy production.

The Independence Strategy will establish Pennsylvania as a leader in the clean energy sector and provide relief to strained citizens. It is estimated that the plan for energy conservation and green alternative energy production will save the residents and businesses of Pennsvlvania almost \$10 billion over the next 10 years. The sun is shining on Pennsylvania and we'll enable more citizens to reap its' benefits, literally and figuratively.


