# VOTER PHOTO IDENTIFICATION INFORMATION

Just a reminder this November when you go to the poll all voters will be required to show photo identification (ID). This year Pennsylvania House Bill 934 was passed in the State House. A voter will be required to show an approved photo ID with their name, a photo of themselves and it must include an expiration date.

#### **Acceptable Voter IDs**

- Photo IDs issued by the U.S. Government or the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania such as:
  - A Pennsylvania Driver's License or non-drivers license photo ID (IDs are valid for voting purposes 12 months past expiration date)
  - Valid U.S. passport
  - U.S. military ID active duty and retired military (a military or veteran's ID must designate an expiration date or designate that the expiration date is indefinite). Military dependents' ID must contain an expiration date
- Employee photo ID issued by Federal, PA, PA County or PA Municipal government
- Photo ID cards from an accredited public or private Pennsylvania college, university, or seminary

 Photo ID cards issued by a (licensed) Pennsylvania care facility, including long-term care facilities, assisted living residences or personal care homes.

### Obtaining an ID for voting if you do not have one

If you are a registered voter and do not have one of these IDs, and require one for voting purposes, you are entitled to get one free of charge at a Penn DOT Driver License Center (DLC).

A registered voter can go down to the nearest DLC and complete an application for Initial Photo Identification Card (DL-54A). HOWEVER, I would take a completed form with you to the DLC. Forms can be downloaded off the internet at www.dmv.state.pa.us/pdotforms/dl\_forms/dl-54a.pdf

Along with the completed form you need to take with you two forms of identification and two forms of residency. One form of identification must be your Social Security Card along with one of the following:

- Birth Certificate (Must be official with a raised seal)
- Valid U. S. Passport
- Certificate of U. S. Citizenship
- Certificate of Naturalization Plus, you will also need to take along two forms of residency such as:
  - Lease agreement
  - Current utility bills
  - Mortgage documents
  - W-2 form
  - Tax records

#### **Absentee Ballots**

Applications for an Absentee Ballot are due to your County Board of Elections by October 30<sup>th</sup>. And the completed ballots must be received by your County Board of Elections by November 2<sup>nd</sup>.

On the application for an Absentee Ballot you need to list one of the two:

- Last 4 digits of your Social Security #
- Your Driver's License #

#### Your rights

Nobody legally entitled to vote can be denied the right to do so even if you don't have a photo ID.

You may cast a provisional ballot, than you will have six days to provide your photo ID to your County Elections Office to have your ballot count.

# New Grant Program Connects Students with High-demand Occupations

Part of a recently enacted law allows the Pennsylvania Higher Education Assistance Agency (PHEAA) to provide grants to students seeking training and education in high-demand occupations. Previously, PHEAA grants were only awarded to Pennsylvania residents enrolled in a two-year or four-year degree program.

The new Pennsylvania
Targeted Industry Program
(PA-TIP) targets courses of
study that are at least 10
weeks but less than two
academic years in length in the
energy, advanced materials
and diversified manufacturing,
and agriculture and food
production fields. Courses
within these fields are typically
offered at community colleges
and business, trade and

technical schools. Additionally, the program assists students enrolled in programs of study that are not eligible for Pennsylvania State Grants.

For more information and to see a complete list of eligible courses, please visit www.pheaa.org/funding-opportunities, and then click on PA-TIP.

The program provides grants up to the equivalent of the maximum State Grant award (\$4,348) or 75 percent of the student's allowable cost, whichever is less. These grants can be used to cover costs such as tuition, fees, books and supplies, or they may be used as an educational expense allowance.

The program is funded with \$5 million of PHEAA's business earnings. The program will provide funding to qualified applicants on a first-come, first-served basis.

Students interested in receiving an award must submit a Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA) and a PA-TIP student application.

Dear Neighbors,

Throughout the summer, the City has been working vigorously to improve streets, repair sidewalks and upgrade the overall maintenance of our neighborhoods. The Department of Public Works (DPW) maintains and cleans our City's streets, parks and public spaces, working to beautify our neighborhoods and make them safer.

The warm summer months allow more outdoor work to be completed, and this year we've raised the bar by increasing the amount of streets paved and working with more community groups to clean up their blocks. So far this summer, we have paved almost 50 miles of City streets and expect to complete 60 miles by the end of this year. Also, 56 new handicap ramps have been installed, with an expected 104 to be completed by the year's end. DPW has also worked with Redd Up and Green Up groups to clean 43 lots, board up 102 abandoned buildings, clear 466 tons of debris, create 12 new community gardens and officially open the South Side Dog Park. If you haven't checked it out yet, visit the City's newest dog park at 18th Street and Riverfront Park.

The City's parks are fun, safe areas for families and children to socialize during the summer and after school. Safety repairs and improvements have recently been made to many of the City's 145 parks and playgrounds, including upgraded courts, lighting and overall appearance. Also, over the summer, 17 City pools have been available for families to enjoy, including the repaired and improved Moore Pool in Brookline.

All year round, the City works diligently to keep our neighborhoods safe and clean, providing the environment, resources and services that make Pittsburgh America's "Most Livable City." Please do your part to keep up the progress by working with neighbors and City representatives to combat blight, litter and crime, and help continue the transformation of our City.


